CJI does not provide services or goods directly to the public in the way that other front line public authorities do. However, we regard our customers as being the users of the criminal justice system, the organisations we inspect, the general public in Northern Ireland, and our sponsoring body, the Department of Justice (DOJ), the Minister of Justice and the Justice Committee.

Policy developments are those made by CJI which relate to our activities, and those developments made as a result of inspection activity, inspection findings and recommendations made by CJI for other organisations to implement.

Internal CJI activities

Within the reporting period CJI continued consulting on its proposed inspection programme. CJI continued to contact our consultees directly with the proposed inspection programme and invited them to attend a series of meetings to supply their feedback. Information from these meetings and any feedback received in other formats was collated and used to further define our inspection programme. The approach included direct engagement with elected representatives to enable them to raise issues concerning any of the s.75 categories. This programme was subsequently agreed by the Minister of Justice. The outcome is that we are assured that the inspection programme has had input from a wide selection of groups and individuals representing the s.75 categories.

During the period no new or revised policies were developed.

CJI continued to promote equality of opportunity and good relations through our OPCAT obligations to monitor places of detention

 - In its role as a member of the National Preventive Mechanism, in 2016-17 CJI inspected a range of places of detention in Northern Ireland, including prisons, the juvenile justice centre, police custody and court custody. New OPCAT guidelienes on segregation and isolation may have an impact on promoting equality of opportunity and good relations.
 - CJI reported that the prisoner recall system showed offenders who have attempted to deal with their offending behaviour while in prison and are released on licence, can move on and contribute positively to society. Others who do not address their offending behaviour, experience mental illness, have limited family support, poor life skills or education and may face homelessness, alcohol or drug addiction, struggle to keep from reoffending or breaching their parole or licence conditions and are recalled to custody.
 - CJI found limited progress had been made in promoting equality and diversity in an inspection of Maghaberry prison. There was a continued disparity in outcomes for Catholic prisoners across many areas and processes for reporting and investigating discrimination complaints still needed improvement. The identification of those with disabilities and the support provided had improved. Forums for older prisoners were now held and some good work with foreign nationals continued. However, the prison still failed adequately to acknowledge the needs of some other minority groups. The faith needs of most prisoners were met although access to corporate worship was still problematic for some.
 - CJI found that the management of equality and diversity work in Ash House (women's prison) and Hydebank College (young men) needed further development. Women and young adults did not consistently attend at monthly equality and diversity meetings. CJI recommended the strategic management of equality and diversity should have a multi-disciplinary approach and more involvement from and a greater focus on women and young men. Monitoring data should be clearly explained and publicised and external practitioners should be consulted in line with the NIPS equality and diversity improvement plan.
 - CJI looked at the efficiency and effectiveness of the arrangements in place in the PSNI to manage and disclose information to the Coroners Service for Northern Ireland in support of legacy inquests. The inspection made five recommendations to the PSNI aimed at improving processes.
 - CJI's Anti-Social Behaviour follow-up review found levels of anti-social behaviour had reduced although anti-social behaviour remained a substantial challenge for some communities. Inspectors welcomed the work undertaken by Policing and Community Safety Partnerships, Reducing Offending Partnerships and Youth Engagement Clinics to help young people desist from persistent or low-level offending behaviour.
